### **ALNS Leadership Changes**



Following the appointment of Mr Doherty as the Head Teacher at ALNS in January 23 work has been underway to review and restructure the school leadership team. The rationale behind the review and subsequent changes was to:

• ensure the Senior Leadership Team has the capacity to be exceptional

- to Support the growth of the school as it reaches its full capacity of 1260 students in September 2024
- support succession planning and leadership development
- retain staff and support recruitment where this is needed
- further enhance teaching and learning across the school
- support the development of languages education through the NCLE hub; and
- create consistency across the trust to support collaborative working. Following the completion of this review the School is now fully staffed in both our teaching staff and support staff ready for the start of the next academic year- and we are delighted that the majority of appointments were able to be made from with the existing team reinforcing our ethos of growing and developing our own staff and creating opportunities for staff development, ensuring we retain first class teaching staff at all levels of our schools. We would like to congratulate all the staff who achieved new roles in the restructure full details of which are available on the school website.

### Mayfield School - update



We are pleased to announce that, subject to the completion of the final parts of the legal process, Mayfield School will officially be joining the Salterns Academy Trust from the 1st October 2024.

Staff and leaders from across the Trust have been working closely with colleagues at Mayfield as part of the schools improvement journey for the last year and the school already feels like an integral part of the Salterns Academy Trust family - so whilst formally completing the process is important, we expect it to be business as usual at the school, with all staff focused on the continual improvement work already underway.

We look forward to the opportunities that formally having Mayfield within the Trust will offer all three schools and the real benefits this will bring to over 3,500 students and their families in the north of Portsmouth.

## Salterns Trust leading the way on Restorative and Relational practice



Leaders at Trafalgar School have continued to provide professional development to a range of schools across the primary and secondary phases. This has included launching Relational Practice, support for planning in house CPD, delivering training for circle leads and training students to be RP ambassadors in their schools.

Trafalgar School has continued to welcome Headteachers and senior leaders from schools across the city and beyond to introduce them to what it feels like to be a relational and restorative school. The most senior leaders across all our Trust schools, alongside leaders from wave 1 schools and PCC colleagues, are taking part in a Relational Leadership course delivered by The Restorative Lab. In September, Claire Copeland, the Trust Director of Education, will be co-facilitating the delivery of this course with The Lab to wave two schools.

It is evident from our work with school and PCC leaders that there is an increasing culture shift in our city towards building communities where students, staff and parents alike feel a strong sense of belonging where challenge and support are high in all aspects of school life.

### **Trafalgar School Science Fair**

Earlier this year Trafalgar School hosted its first ever Science Fair. Key stage 3 pupils were able to proudly display their science home learning projects alongside their completed CREST projects.

These projects included making 3D atoms, producing a periodic table, devising a wind turbine, or even finding out which music is preferred by plants! CREST projects are nationally reviewed and here, sixteen pupils were able to obtain bronze level awards examining how to identify fake metals in fraudulent coins or how to make and test bottle rockets. Our science fair was judged by Professor Thomas Collet from the University of Portsmouth and Stephen Morgan M.P.

Moreover, our judges met various key stage 4 pupils to discuss their science education and their future aspirations in science. They also spent some time with our two National Junior Genius science scholars winners.

Our science fair was open to the public and it was fantastic to see some many parents and carers come into the school and see the incredible science being done at Trafalgar school.









### **Made in Portsmouth**

Earlier this term Students from both Trafalgar School and Admiral Lord Nelson School took part in the prestigious cross school competition "Made in Portsmouth"

The competition, which took place at Gunwharf Quays involved "Dragons Den" style pitches with students working on a brief that was delivered to them at the beginning of the day, where they were set a challenge to reimagine a vacant space in the centre to best serve the Portsmouth community.

We were delighted that the Trafalgar school team came first - winning team a place in the made in UK finals. - and whilst they did not bring home the national prize the judges feedback on the finalists was that it was a really close call and they all did extremely well!

A huge well done to everyone who took part!



### **Portsmouth Cup - Salterns Football Success**

This year, the ALNS year 7, 8 and year 10, and Trafalgar Year 11 boys football teams made the Portsmouth Cup finals. All of the finals were played at the brand-new King George V football complex. The year 7 boys had their cup final first and after a very tight start to the game, they continued to play some great football and the goals started to come with the final result being 6-0 to ALNS.

The year 8 ALNS team had their cup final on the following day and the sun was shining! They started the game really well, keeping good possession of the ball and creating chances. However, they found themselves 2-0 down in the first half. ALNS managed to get a goal back just before the half time whistle and then equalised around five minutes into the second half, making the score 2-2. ALNS continued to create chances and found themselves 3-2 up after a fantastic counter attacking goal. However, the opposition scored a few minutes after this to take the game to extra time at 3-3. We were very close to going to a penalty shootout but with 20 seconds remaining, the opposition whipped in a corner that was unfortunately headed in at the back post. This resulted in ALNS losing 4-3 (AET) but they should be proud of their brilliant performance.

The ALNS year 10 team had their cup final on the following Tuesday. The boys kept possession of the ball very well in the early stages of the game but were struggling to convert any of their chances, the majority of the game was being played in the oppositions half but couldn't break the deadlock before half time. However, the goals started coming in the second half after they continued to keep the ball and create chances with the final result being 10-0 to ALNS. Very good performance from all.

In an exhilarating display of skill and teamwork, the year Trafalgar School 11's clinched a Portsmouth Cup Final win for the second time, overpowering their opponents with a decisive victory. The final took place at Havant and Waterlooville's ground, where the atmosphere was electric with anticipation from both sides.

Trafalgar set the tone early in the match. An early goal boosted the team's confidence, and they maintained relentless pressure throughout the first half. The second half followed a similar pattern, with Trafalgar maintaining their relentless pace. Trafalgar's midfield orchestrated the play, ensuring a seamless transition from defence to attack, which left the opposition with little chance to regain possession or mount any counterattacks. This dynamic play saw Trafalgar extend their lead by a further two goals, culminating in a 6-0 Victory for Trafalgar

The team's performance throughout the tournament has been exceptional, showcasing their growth and development over the years.

## **Solent Languagaes Hub progress celebrated at NCLE conference**



The Solent Language Hub team gave a dynamic presentation showcasing innovative, evidence-based practices and inspirational teaching methods designed to spark a love for languages among students and teachers alike. This presentation focussed on the question "How do we motivate pupils to find personal and cultural relevance in language learning?". Our session delved into fascinating research and case studies by those such as Suzanne Graham and Ulrich Schiefele and was enriched by insights from over 300 surveyed Portsmouth school students. The presentation provoked some thoughtful questions and was well-received.

In what was a busy week for the Solent Language Hub we were thrilled to also host the 2nd Hub working group meeting which was brimming with the dedication of Portsmouth's heads of languages, all united in our mission to boost language learning! The energy and enthusiasm in the room were truly inspiring as we delved into innovative strategies and shared best practices. It was fantastic to witness such a collaborative spirit, with representation from primary, secondary, colleges, university, and ITE providers, all contributing valuable insights and ideas. This meeting not only reinforced our shared goals but also highlighted the incredible potential we have when we work together.
